**A Cook Family Legacy**

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Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, 1869. The first inter-racial baseball game is played in the city<sup>1</sup>. The Black Pythians vs. the white Olympics with the Pythians as the victors. The Knights of Labor is established as the United States' first national industrial union.<sup>2</sup> An animal cruelty statute was established that eliminated dogfighting.<sup>3</sup> The Schuylkill River experienced its most significant flooding event of all time, cresting at 17 feet.<sup>4</sup>

### Family Group One

However, the most important event of the year occurred on August 11<sup>th</sup> when Harry Forrest was born to Edwin and Anna Cook.<sup>5</sup> Edwin was a soap and candle manufacturer, and Anna or "Annie" was a homemaker. At the time of Harry's birth, they lived with their Irish domestic, Annie Ward, in Philadelphia Ward 15, District 43.<sup>6</sup> In 1873, Harry was joined by his brother Edwin Jr. According to the 1880 census, the family lived at 402 N. 43<sup>rd</sup> Street. Edwin Sr. was a hide and tallow manufacturer and Anna, a homemaker. They had a servant named Rachel Harris who lived with them, also from Philadelphia.<sup>7</sup>

Sallie Matille Prickett was born to Dillwyn Prickett and Eliza Malpass in Philadelphia on December 22, 1870<sup>8</sup>... or 1871.<sup>9</sup> Dillwyn Prickett was a druggist on the corner of Reed and S. 10<sup>th</sup> in Philadelphia.<sup>10</sup> Census records indicate that Eliza, a 25-year-old from Walcot, Bath, England, was counted among her family in the 1870 census which took place on November 15<sup>th</sup>. She married Dillwyn on November 16, 1870.<sup>11</sup> Sallie's age at the time of her marriage is listed as 19 which would put her birth in 1871. Sallie's death certificate and gravestone list her birth year as 1870.<sup>12</sup> Did Dillwyn and Eliza marry because little Sallie was on the way? Did she tell



people she was born in 1871 to avoid scandal? Possibly. According to probate records, Mr. Prickett died in 1876 in Burlington, New Jersey.<sup>13</sup>

Sallie Matille Prickett married Harry Forrest Cook on October 21, 1891,<sup>14</sup> at St. Stephen's Episcopal Church in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. The wedding reception took place at the home of the bride's parents who are listed as Mr. and Mrs. Carl Gardeicke, at 1007 Spruce Street. City directories confirm that Mrs. Carl Gardeicke is Eliza. Edwin, Harry's brother is listed as page and the bride's brother, Harry Malpass, is listed as an usher.<sup>15</sup>

Matille Anna was born to Sallie and Harry on September 12, 1892, according to her baptism records<sup>16</sup> and 1893 according to her death certificate<sup>17</sup>, in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania.

In January of 1898, Harry and Sallie and Harry's parents attended the Royal St. Laurence Yacht Club Ball at Windsor Hall, according to *The Gazette*.<sup>18</sup>

Marion Elizabeth was born to Sallie and Harry on August 26, 1899, in Quebec, Canada.<sup>19</sup>

Early family ties are being formed at The Century Cavaliers dance attended by Mrs. Edwin F. Cook, Marion Elizabeth's grandmother, and Mrs. E.A. Gaskill, the grandmother of Joseph Franklin Gaskill, Marion's future spouse. The dance took place at the Academy of Music in April of 1890 as reported by *The Philadelphia Times*.<sup>20</sup>

The 1901 Census of Canada lists the Cooks living in the Hochelaga district of Quebec, Canada.

<sup>21</sup>Matille Anna is 8-years old, Marion is one.. Two French domestics lived with them, Euphrosine Cyr and Malvina Grenier. The immigration year is listed as 1879. Perhaps Harry found work in

Canada and came back to America, met and married Sallie and they came back to Canada to start their family.

Lillian Faye is born to Sallie and Harry on July 14, 1901, in Quebec, Canada.<sup>22</sup>

Harry Forrest Jr. is born to Sallie and Harry on July 20, 1903, in Quebec, Canada.<sup>23</sup>

In 1907 *The Philadelphia Inquirer* reports that Sallie joined a women's automobile club, an auxiliary of the Quaker City Motor Club.<sup>24</sup>

*The Gazette* reported Harry, a representative of the D.B. Martin Co., Ltd as a new member of the International Exhibition of Agriculture in July of 1909. The D.B. Martin Co. manufactured "Neet feet and Lard Oils". They also made glue and Harry raised horses and that's as much thought as I want to give to that.<sup>25</sup>

Edwin Forrest Cook, Harry's father died of vascular heart disease on October 18, 1911, at home, 213 S. 41<sup>st</sup> Philadelphia.<sup>26</sup>

The 1910 Census is a swollen Cook household with eight members listed at 224 South 44<sup>th</sup> Street in Philadelphia. Harry's occupation is listed as a Secretary for a Meat Company. Matille Anna is 17, Marion Elizabeth is 10, Lillian Fay is 8, and Harry Forrest Jr. is 6. Addie Stearn and Grace White, both from Virginia, are listed as Servants.<sup>27</sup>

In May of 1912, *The Gazette* reported the attendance of Sallie and Harry with Matille Anna at the opening of The Arena. Louise Margaret, Her Royal Duchess of Connaught who was the daughter of Prince Friedrich Karl of Prussia was also in attendance.<sup>28</sup>

According to *The Gazette* Matille Anna visited her grandmother, Mrs. Edwin F. Cook, and Mrs. H. S. Riding in Philadelphia in January of 1913.<sup>29</sup> Mrs. Ridings will be the future mother-in-law of Matille.

In March of 1913, Marion Elizabeth hosted a Five Hundred Party for “not-outs”. Five Hundred, I learned, is a card game based on Euchre. “Not-Outs” is a cricket term. I had assumed it was relating to debutants, but I could not find the language confirming this. Lillian Faye and Sallie assisted Marion, according to the Social and Personal column in *The Gazette*.<sup>30</sup>

*The Montreal Star* reported Harry enjoying a night out with Marion and Lillian at The Arena for a horse show in May of 1914.<sup>31</sup>

Matille Anna marries Horace S. Ridings Jr. in April 11, 1914 in Montreal at Congregational Emmanuel.<sup>32</sup>

The 1920 census brings us to St. Asaph’s Road in Bala, Lower Merion, Montgomery, Pennsylvania. The household now features nine residents. Harry is listed as a manufacturer of meats. Matille Anna is no longer listed as she has married in 1916. Marion Elizabeth is 20, Lillian Fay is 18, Harry Forrest Jr. is 16. Anna, Harry’s widowed mother lives with the family now as well as two maids, Sarah Duge of South Carolina, and Alice L. Jetter of Virginia. Joseph Pasquale of Italy is their chauffeur.<sup>33</sup>

Sallie and Lillian spent a few weeks in Atlantic City together in August of 1921, according to *The Philadelphia Inquirer*, pre-wedding getaway for Lillian and her mother.<sup>34</sup>

Lillian Faye married Montgomery Adams Simons at her parents' home on St. Asaph's Road in Bala. on November 21, 1921, in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. Her sister, Marion, served as her maid of honor. <sup>35</sup>

Marion Elizabeth married Joseph Franklin Gaskill on September 29, 1923, at Church of the Savior in West Philadelphia.<sup>36</sup>

Matille and Horace Ridings Jr. had a son, Horace Smith Riding III in 1918, a daughter, Matille Jean Ridings in 1920, and another son, Forrest Cook Riding in 1924.<sup>37</sup>

Marion and Joseph Gaskill had a daughter named Marion Cook Gaskill in 1924 and a son, Joseph Franklin Gaskill Jr. in 1929.<sup>38</sup>

Lillian and Montgomery Simons had one son named Montgomery Adams Simons Jr. in 1926<sup>39</sup>

Sallie attended a tea at the Women's Missionary Society of the First Methodist Church in December of 1932, at the home of Ida P. Allen on Flamingo Drive, as reported by *The Palm Beach Post*. Interestingly, The Palm Beach Post is my hometown paper and Flamingo drive is about two miles from my current home.<sup>40</sup>

Matille Prickett Cook died of arterio-sclerosis with a contributing factor of congestion or edema of the lungs, on February 10, 1938, at the age of 67 in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania.<sup>41</sup> She is buried in West Laurel Hill Cemetery, Bala-Cynwyd, Pennsylvania.<sup>42</sup> Harry Forrest Cook died March 25, 1944 in Philadelphia after suffering a heart attack while driving. He is also buried in West Laurel Hill Cemetery.<sup>43</sup>

Matille Ridings died on April 25, 1968.<sup>44</sup> Marion Gaskill died on November 30, 1973.<sup>45</sup> Lillian Simons died July 23, 1971.<sup>46</sup>

### **Family Group Two**

Over in New Jersey, there's an eight-year-old little girl named Violet Marie Genter. According to the 1910 census, Violet lives at 65 Marson Avenue in Wenonah, Gloucester with her father, Harry and her mother, Anna, and her 13-year-old sister, Mildred Louise. Harry works as a carpenter building houses. Harry is from Germany and Anna was born in Pennsylvania while both of their children were born in New Jersey. According to her baptism certificate, Violet was born on October 21, 1901.<sup>47</sup>

According to the Gloucester County Democrat, Violet Marie performed in the Methodist Episcopal Sunday School's Christmas Cantata as a singing "dolly painter".<sup>48</sup> In fifth grade, Violet won a prize for an essay she wrote concerning tobacco and alcohol use and was on the honor roll in sixth grade.<sup>49</sup> Violet spends quite a lot of time visiting with her cousin, Catherine Meredith. They go back and forth to each other's homes.<sup>50</sup>

The 1920 census shows 18-year-old Violet still at home with her parents though Mildred had moved on and married to Carl Shultz in 1918. The family has moved to 32 Union Avenue. The whole household is working with Harry still a carpenter, Anna in millinery, and Violet as a clerk in the Railroad Office.<sup>51</sup>

As of this writing I do not, after exhaustive search, which included contacting one living daughter-in-law and every living grandchild of Harry and Violet, have a definitive marriage date

or location of marriage for this couple. Violet was 28 at the time of the 1930 census and 20 at the time of her marriage which would put their wedding in 1921 -1922. The New Jersey State Archivist, Catherine Medich, suggested that perhaps they eloped to nearby Elkton, Maryland.

Harry Forrest III was born to Harry Forrest Jr. and Violet Marie on April 7, 1922.<sup>52</sup> A second son, Richard Genter would be born on October 29, 1925.<sup>53</sup> And finally, Jack Ernest Cook would complete the family on May 6, 1927.<sup>54</sup> All three sons were born in Camden, New Jersey.

In 1930, Harry Forrest Jr. lives at 165 Carlisle Road in Audubon, Camden, New Jersey. He runs a business as a sign painter and supports a Violet, a homemaker, and their three children: Harry Forrest III or "Bud" is 7, Richard Genter is 4, and Jack Ernest is 2.<sup>55</sup>

Harry Forrest Jr. is listed as a veteran. However, he is not a veteran according to the 1950 census. He registered for the draft in 1941.

In 1940 the census locates the Harry and Violet Cook residence at 11A Arnold Ave in Abington, Pennsylvania. Harry is working as a salesman for the Philadelphia Electric Company. This census tells us that Violet completed up to her junior year of high school. Harry Forrest III is 18, Richard Genter is 13, and Jack Ernest is 12.<sup>56</sup>

Harry Forrest III registered for the draft in 1945. He was, at the time a retired veteran at 23 after having served in World War II in the Marine Corp.<sup>57</sup>

Richard Genter met Jean Marian Hay while both were attending Abington High School. He was class president, she class secretary. Richard graduated high school in 1943, joined the Navy as a Machinist Mate Second Class and served during World War II at Kaneohe Bay, Hawaii. There, he found a Christian faith that would become his life's work.<sup>58</sup> After his discharge, he married Jean Hay July 27, 1946, at Roslyn Presbyterian Church in Roslyn, Pennsylvania. Harry Forrest III served as best man.<sup>59</sup> Jack Ernest was serving in the United States Army Constabulary in Germany.<sup>60</sup>

The 1950 census shows Harry Forrest III and Dorothy Giroud living in Wilmington, Delaware. Harry is a contractor and Dorothy is a typist.<sup>61</sup>

By the 1950 census, Harry Forrest Jr. and Violet Marie are empty nesters living at 19 Church Street, Upper Moreland, Pennsylvania. Harry Forrest Jr. is still a salesman for the Philadelphia Electric Company and Violet, a homemaker.<sup>62</sup>

Harry Forrest III and Dorothy Giroud had three children: Karen, Lisa, and Wendy.

Harry Forrest Jr. had a heart attack and died while driving December 5, 1963.<sup>89</sup> He is buried in Hillside Cemetery in Roslyn, Pennsylvania.

Richard and Jean had three children: Barbara Jean (1950), Richard Genter Jr. (1949), and Ellen Ruth(1954). Sadly, Richard Jr. was killed in a car accident at the age of 15 while the family was serving as missionaries on Thetis Island, British Columbia. "Richie" is buried there. Barbara and Ellen are alive and well and living in Gresham and Astoria, Oregon, respectively.<sup>63</sup>

Violet Marie Genther Cook died in Wilmington, Delaware on April 10, 1986. She had been living in an assisted living facility since 1978, suffering from advanced dementia.<sup>90</sup> Her place of burial is unknown. I contacted all her living grandchildren and her one living daughter-in-law and there is no knowledge of a burial place. Perhaps she is buried with Harry Forrest Jr. but I do not have confirmation that it is so.

A little over a month later, Harry Forrest III died on May 30, 1986 at the age of 64 of heart failure at Christiana Hospital in Wilmington, Delaware.<sup>64</sup>

Richard Genther died July 31, 2003 in Gresham, Oregon.<sup>65</sup> Jean Marion died May 17, 2017 also in Gresham, Oregon.<sup>66</sup>

### **Family Group Three**

411 Moreland Road, Willow Grove, Pennsylvania. Florence and Joseph Wilson are throwing a going away party for their son, Joseph Jr. who is shipping out. Jack Ernest Cook, a friend of Joseph's has been invited to the party. Jack Ernest sees a girl across the room and tells Joseph Jr. "I'm going to marry that girl." The girl is Joseph Jr.'s sister, Lorraine Florence Wilson.<sup>67</sup>

Lorraine Florence was born to Joseph Stevenson Wilson and Florence Mae Hunsberger November 4, 1927, in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania.<sup>68</sup>



In 1930, the Wilson family lives at 41 Ridge Road in West Rockhill, Bucks County, Pennsylvania. Lorraine lives here with her parents and her brother Joseph Jr. who is five years old. Joseph Sr. is listed as a merchant of farm produce. According to this census, neither Joseph Sr. nor Florence attended school, both are from Pennsylvania.<sup>69</sup>

Lorraine Florence is 12 for the 1940 census. The family now lives at 32 Church Street in Upper Moreland. Lorraine is in 7<sup>th</sup> grade; her brother Joseph Jr. or “Joe” is 15 years old and in 10<sup>th</sup> grade. Daniel Wilson, Joseph Jr.’s 73-year-old father now lives with the family as well. This census tells us that Joseph Sr. completed up to 8<sup>th</sup> grade and Florence to 9<sup>th</sup> grade. Joseph Sr.’s occupation is listed as “Huckster”.<sup>70</sup>

In 1943, the Cook family moved to 411 Moreland Road in Willow Grove, Pennsylvania. Lorraine Florence graduated Upper Moreland High School in 1945. She loves music and dancing. Her mother is deeply religious, and Lorraine is heavily involved in church activities. She performs in school plays.<sup>71</sup>

Jack Ernest Cook attended Abington High School in Willow Grove and he likes girls and sports and hopes to be a draftsman. Lorraine and Jack have begun dating. Upon graduation in 1945, much like his brother before him, Jack joins the army and is sent to Germany. As previously mentioned, he serves in the Army constabulary. He writes Lorraine about 250 letters while he is away.

When Jack returns, he and Lorraine are married, November 6, 1948, at the Willow Grove Methodist Church.<sup>73</sup>

The 1950 census finds Jack and Lorraine living at 1372 Gillingham in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. Lorraine is 22 and working as a Clerk -Typist for an insurance company. Jack is a Jet Drafter for Electric Appliances Company.<sup>74</sup>

Thomas Ernest Cook was born to Jack and Lorraine on September 6, 1952, in Philadelphia.<sup>75</sup>

Jack and Lorraine moved their new little family to Kansas City, Missouri when Jack took a job with Westinghouse Electric Co.<sup>76</sup> Here in Kansas City, Paul Harry was born on September 24, 1955,<sup>77</sup> as well as David Joseph on April 22, 1960.<sup>78</sup>

Just a couple months after David's birth, Jack and Lorraine would move to 525 Flotilla Road, North Palm Beach, Florida.<sup>79</sup> Built in 1959, it was one of the first homes in the Village of North Palm Beach. The Village was built to support the housing needs of the employees of the Pratt & Whitney Aircraft Plant built in Palm Beach County in 1958.<sup>80</sup> Tom, Paul, Dave, and I all grew up in this house. Jack would realize his dream of being a draftsman and would work for this company for the greatest portion of his life, until retirement at the age of 65.

Jack and Lorraine dove into life in Florida. All three boys went to the local public schools. They bought a boat, the boys and Jack joined the local chapter of Indian Guides, and they enjoyed the many social opportunities offered by the North Palm Beach Country Club. Jack and Lorraine join Immanuel Presbyterian church in Lake Park, a neighboring town. They are heavily involved and become leaders, Jack as a Deacon and Lorraine, head of a Circle group, they deliver flowers and church programs and meals to shut ins and host missionaries in their home who are passing through town. Jack becomes an avid tennis player.<sup>81</sup>

Tom was in the first graduating class of Palm Beach Gardens High School in 1970 Paul graduated from North Shore High School in 1973, and David graduated from North Shore High School in 1978.<sup>82</sup>

Tom married Deborah Adamson September 6, 1975.<sup>83</sup> They have three children and three grandchildren and live in Orlando, Florida. David married Susan Bosse September 3, 1983. They have two children and live in Jupiter, Florida.<sup>84</sup>

Paul brings us to me. Paul met Sheila McManus at North Shore High School. Paul and Sheila married December 22, 1973.<sup>85</sup> I, Jennifer, was born April 7, 1974. Sheila graduated from North Shore High School in May, and I was their plus one!

Though they tried, Paul and Sheila ended their marriage in 1978.<sup>86</sup> I went to live with Jack and Lorraine. During this time, Lorraine went to work at the Twin City Mall Sears department store

in North Palm Beach. She worked in Ladies Fashion there for around 20 years, through a closing of one mall, to the opening of a new one, The Gardens in Palm Beach Gardens.

When I was 12 years old, Jack and Lorraine started to drive me to North Carolina for summer camp. After I married Gordon Anthony April 19, 1997, Jack and Lorraine sold 525 Flotilla Road and started a new chapter in Maggie Valley, North Carolina. They lived there close to 15 years until Jack began showing signs of dementia. They moved back to Juno Beach, Florida. They lived together in an apartment until Lorraine could no longer care for Jack and he moved to assisted living in the same complex.<sup>87</sup>

Jack died February 26, 2016, with Lorraine, David, and me by his side.<sup>87</sup> After, Lorraine spent the next years enjoying her friends and family. She loved a meal out and a good chat. The pandemic was very difficult for her as she was so social. However, she stayed well. She was diagnosed with cancer in 2021. It was an infection and subsequent complications from her hospitalizations and convalescence, however, that led to her death, August 4, 2022.<sup>88</sup> She and Jack were cremated, and their remains are interred in Riverside Memorial Cemetery in Tequesta, Florida. Jack's brother, Harry Forrest III's wife Dorothy is still alive at 101 years old and living in Sebastian, Florida. Dorothy Wilson, the wife of Lorraine's brother Joseph celebrated her 98<sup>th</sup> birthday last year and lives in Cinnaminson, New Jersey.

This project was challenging and rewarding. Through it, I have contacted distant relatives, some I've never met. It's been a gift to talk to people who knew and loved my grandparents well and hear their stories.

# Dedication Program Planned To Open New Pratt & Whitney Aircraft Plant

**1,300 Employees  
At Work; 3,500  
Due Next Year**

Beginning with a mere handful of employees at the opening of the DeSoto Building office in November of 1934, the Pratt & Whitney family has grown to more than 2,000 employees during the 12 months since.

Employment buildup has far exceeded the prediction made by General Manager Charles T. Buehler when the West Palm Beach office was opened.

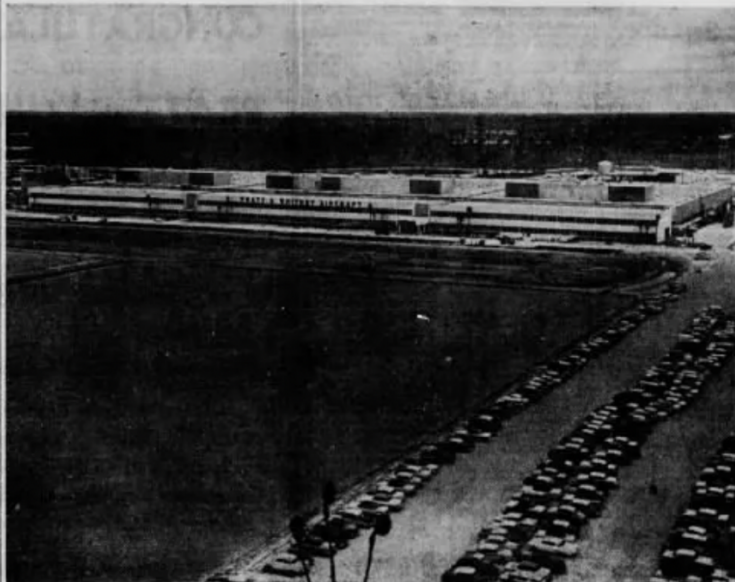
In forecast at that time a growth to 20 employees in the first month, 300 by the middle of 1937, and 2,000 by the middle of 1938.

These milestones of tenfold expansion have since been projected into next year. It is now estimated that 3,500 employees will be in the Florida operation by the end of 1939.

As individuals, they are seeking places for effective work in P.W.'s Big Seven, Chambers of Commerce, and in the many other church, civil, and welfare groups.



**Huge Jet Engine  
Facility Extends  
Over 7,000 Acres**

A three-day dedication program celebrating the official opening of the new experimental jet engine design and test plant and other facilities of Pratt & Whitney Aircraft will be held today, Tuesday, and Wednesday at the plant site 11 miles southwest of West Palm Beach.

Activities will begin with an open house for employees and their families this afternoon from 5 to 8 p.m. Official dedication ceremonies are scheduled Tuesday with government, military, and company officials as guests. A radio announcement of Chairman of Congress representatives from throughout the state is planned Wednesday.

Along up from the double end platform of the 7,000 acre Pratt & Whitney tract is the main plant covering 40,000 square feet. The main building spreads out over 11 acres, including 25 acres of experimental shops and five acres of office space and cafeteria.

Fronting the newly landscaped 1,000-foot level of the building are two lakes. These are water storage reservoirs with a capacity of 200,000,000 gallons. They are the low-flow glass basin which will be drained to raise the ground level for the main building.

To the east and west of the lakes are paved parking areas. Each are equipped with lighting installations. On the east of the main building is the air conditioning plant, the largest one in Florida.

Ceremonies dedicating the new Pratt & Whitney Aircraft, Florida operation, will be held in a special program. Tuesday noon representatives from throughout the state in the experimental shop area in the main building.

Guests for the occasion will be officials of the United Aircraft Corp., dignitaries from the Postoffice in Washington, representatives from state, county, and municipal governments, and major contractors who participated in the plant construction.

Charles T. Buehler, general manager of Pratt & Whitney in Florida, will welcome the guests and introduce the speakers.

"One Florida Operator" will be the name of S. P. Givens, president of United Aircraft from East Hartford, Conn. U. S. Sen. Spencer H. Hildred will speak on "Industry in Florida."
